<u>LOCAL LAW INTRO. 3-20</u> – Amending Local Law 7-90 Providing for a Management Salary Plan for County Officers and Employees

Chairman Chagnon: Are there any questions, comments, discussion on the proposed local law?

Legislator Bankoski: Mr. Chairman, I don't doubt that our supervisory staff has went above and beyond and have been working very diligently and hard during the pandemic, but I just feel that granting these raises right now with so many uncertainties in our upcoming year that I'll be voting no.

Chairman Chagnon: Thank you. Any other questions or comments?

Legislator Lawton: I just wanted to point out that really this resolution isn't related to raises for any individuals, but more than that, it's a management of salary ranges. It's something that the Legislature regularly does (*inaudible*.) This resolution would adjust supervisory and managerial payroll ranges by an increase of 1.5%. In my experience this is a conservative, prudent increase. It's an effort to stay in line with inflation and it's a pay scale that will obtain and attract employees.

Chairman Chagnon: Thank you, Ken. Other questions, comments, discussion?

Legislator Rankin: Thank you. I wanted to thank Legislator Bankoski. I want to echo his comments that it's no reflection on the kind of work everyone has done, but I know that there is an expectation with the salary ranges and what people sign up for when they go for a job and I think it's really difficult to add any kind of increase for the tax payers. It takes away nothing from the hard work these managers have done, but I can't support this given the current circumstances. Thank you.

Chairman Chagnon: Thank you. Other questions or comments? Seeing none and hearing none, will the clerk please call the roll?

Chairman Chagnon: Questions or comments?

Legislator Odell: Thank you very much. These next several resolutions regard authorizing budgeted agreements with the County of Chautauqua Industrial Development Agency for business assistance, industrial development and promotion, and the attraction and development of tourism related businesses. The IDA significantly leverages this budgeted funding to successfully (inaudible) and it's worth noting that the funding in these resolutions represent a 17.5% or more decrease from last year. I am pleased to represent this legislative body as a member of the board of the County of Chautauqua Industrial Development Agencysometimes with a little contention, but that's O.K. I feel it's important (inaudible) some of the significant wins in Chautauqua County that have been spurred on by the IDA. A few of the wins that we've seen that are clearly evident are Celeron Harbor Hotel, (inaudible), Cockaigne in Cherry Creek, Holiday Harbor in Dunkirk, (inaudible) at the Mason Industrial Park and the retention (inaudible) million dollar expansion investment by Wells in Dunkirk, formerly known as Dunkirk Ice Cream and several more projects are also in the pipeline. The IDA manages a 10 plus million dollar revolving loan fund and were invited to apply for and recently won, as we've all learned, \$10 million plus in CARES Act funding to establish a new revolving loan fund, which can encompass much more diverse sectors. Early on in the pandemic we were given permission by the state to use a portion of the (inaudible) revolving loan fund to develop and launch an emergency working capital loan fund, which helped provide critical working capital funding for 25 of our local businesses, who are all grateful for that, especially early on when we were trying to figure out what was going to happen and keeping their doors open. During this time they also developed a grant program with matching funds provided by the Gebbie Foundation, Chautauqua Regional Community Foundation and the Jamestown Rotary with technical assistance being provided by our own Jamestown Community College. This awesome collaboration helped dozens of businesses get up and running by keeping the employees and customers safe with the necessary equipment and protocols to reopen responsibly. I think one of our first commendations by Mr. Ward is a testament to that. So, thank you. I just wanted to share these highlights, commend the management and staff for their outstanding work today with plenty more in line for 2021. Thank you.

Clerk Tampio: I have received two emailed letters that I will read for you at this time. The first one was received December 2, 2020 and it comes from Keith Hagenbuch, P.H.D. of Parable Farms.

"Executive Wendel and Chautauqua County Legislators:

My family and I own the largest farm in South Ripley, on which we raise organic cows, pigs, and turkeys. We have been relying on the future lease payments from the solar farm to supplement the income from our farm, something we have worked diligently to keep in the family for years.

As a retired physics professor and someone who cares about the environment, it is incredibly disappointing to hear the gross misinformation that is being spread about both this project and solar/storage technology in general. Perhaps it is my academic background, but I prefer to make statements that are solidly grounded in fact – not fiction, unlike several of my neighbors. I implore you to do the research, as I have done, and gain the knowledge that both PV solar and storage are proven technologies that communities around the globe not only rely on, but live and work near every day.

I care deeply about my community and believe it can be revitalized. Stay true to your mission and choose to help not only us, but all residents of Ripley, by enabling economic development and improving our way of life.
