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WHEREAS, this legislature has caused a Project map and plan together with an estimate of the cost to be prepared by CPL Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architect and Surveyor, D.P.C., engineers duly licensed by the State of New York; and

Calling a Public Hearing Pursuant to County Law §268 Upon a Proposal to Reduce Infiltration and Inflow in the Portland Pomfret Dunkirk Sewer District

WHEREAS, Resolution 272-77 established the Portland Pomfret Dunkirk Sewer District (PPDSD) in accordance with County Law Article 5-A; and

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WHEREAS, some portions of PPDSO infrastructure were constructed in the early 1980s, and other portions acquired from another party date as far back as the 1930s; and

WHEREAS, the engineering firm of Barton & Loguidice, duly licensed in the State of New York, was engaged to perform a study of the collection system; and

WHEREAS, Barton & Loguidice prepared an engineering report documenting locations of inflow and infiltration (I&I) and making recommendations, and developed a Map and Plan for recommended I&I reduction (the Project) together with an estimate of Project costs; and

WHEREAS, County Law §268 requires that this Legislature call a public hearing on the Map and Plan; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that a public hearing will be held by the Chautauqua County Legislature at the Legislative Chambers, Gerace Office Building, 3 North Erie Street in the Village of Mayville, Chautauqua County, New York on August 24, 2022 at 6:35 PM, prevailing time, on the proposed Project as set forth in the Map and Plan; and be it further

The proposed work includes rehabilitation of sewer main lines with CIPP liner, open-cut replacement of sewer main lines, rehabilitation or replacement of manholes, rehabilitation of pump stations, and replacement of a meter vault with application of an epoxy coating, as detailed in the map and plan prepared by Barton & Loguidice which is on file for inspection in the office of the Clerk of the County Legislature, 3 North Erie Street, Mayville, New York, and available on-line at <https://chqgov.com/legislature/Legislature>.

The estimated cost of the rehabilitation Project is \$1,612,000.00. Implementation of the Project is contingent upon the receipt of a grant in the minimum amount of 25% of the Project cost and receipt of loan funding at zero percent interest for the balance of the Project cost. Costs will be assessed to properties in the various zones of assessment as follows:

Charge Area A1, the sewer system formerly owned by the Van Buren Point Association, Inc. available prior to 1984: a maximum estimated annual cost of \$161.19, which when added to the estimated average annual sewer charge will be expected to result in a maximum annual sewer charge of \$755.78;

Charge Area A2, the sewer system formerly owned by the Shore Acres Association, Inc. available prior to 1984: a maximum estimated annual cost of \$267.59, which when added to the

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estimated average annual sewer charge will be expected to result in a maximum annual sewer charge of \$1,120.13; and

Charge Area B, property served by a collection system which was constructed by the PPDS: a maximum estimated annual cost of \$17.34, which when added to the estimated average annual sewer charge will be expected to result in a maximum annual sewer charge of \$786.16.

Acceptance of FAA Funds for the Rehabilitate Airport Perimeter Fence (Phase 1) at the Chautauqua County/Jamestown Airport

At the Request of County Executive Paul M. Wendel, Jr. and Public Facilities Committee:

WHEREAS, Chautauqua County submitted to the Federal Aviation Administration (“FAA”) a project application and received a grant from the FAA to pay 90% of the allowable costs incurred in accomplishing the following project at the Chautauqua County/Jamestown Airport: Rehabilitate Airport Perimeter Fence (Phase 1) FAA AIP Project No. 250 (“Project”) with a 5% local share and 5% provided by the New York State Department of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, the FAA has approved the Project for Chautauqua County/Jamestown Airport consisting of the Rehabilitate Airport Perimeter Fence (Phase 1), which is more fully described in the Project agreement; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 11-19, Chautauqua County approved the Project as part of the five-year Airport Capital Improvement Plan (“ACIP”) and approved submission of an application for FAA and NYSDOT grant funds for the Rehabilitate Airport Perimeter Fence (Phase 1) under the Airport Improvement Program (“AIP”), and funding shares for the Project are as follows:

WHEREAS, the Airport Commission has considered and recommended that the County accept this funding as the Project is crucial for the operation of the Airport; therefore be it
