LOCAL LAW INTRODUCTORY NO. 3-23 CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LOCAL LAW 10-22 ESTABLISHING A COUNTY LEGISLATURE FOR THE COUNTY OF CHAUTAUQUA REAPPORTIONED ON THE BASIS OF THE 2020 FEDERAL CENSUS

BE IT ENACTED by the Legislature of the County of Chautauqua as follows:

SECTION 1. <u>Purpose</u>. Local Law 10-22 of the County of Chautauqua contains new boundary lines for County Legislature districts reapportioned on the basis of the 2020 Federal Census. Appendix A to Local Law 10-22 contains lists of the United States Census Blocks that make up each legislative district. The lists of census blocks were generated by a computer software program utilized in the mapping of the new districts. The Chautauqua County Board of Elections has identified that in a few instances, the lists of census blocks generated by the computer software do not adhere to municipal boundary lines that serve as legislative district boundary lines. The purpose of this Local Law is to make technical corrections to Appendix A of Local Law 10-22 to conform the lists of census blocks to the municipal boundaries of the districts, and to further confirm that when municipal boundary lines, waterways, shorelines, railroads, and municipal roads or streets are referenced in the written legal descriptions of legislative districts, such references are dispositive of the intended district lines. The corrected lists of census blocks included herein do not change the written legal descriptions of the legislative district boundaries.

SECTION 2. <u>Amendments to Appendix A</u>. The 2020 United States Census Blocks identified for Districts 5, 11, 14, and 15 in Appendix A of Local Law 10-22 of the County of Chautauqua are hereby amended as follows:

- 1. United States Census Blocks 360130361002057 and 360130361003049 shall be added to District 14 and removed from District 5.
- 2. United States Census Block 360130372002000 shall be added to District 15 and removed from District 11.

SECTION 3. <u>Amendment to SECTION 7</u>. SECTION 7 of Local Law 10-22 of the County of Chautauqua is hereby amended to read as follows with the additional amended language underlined:

The Legislative Districts shall consist of the 2020 United States Census Blocks identified in Appendix A to this Local Law. Each district's group of census blocks are further described as set forth below. In the event of an inconsistency between Appendix A and the written description set forth below, the apparent geographic intent of the United States Census Bureau in the formulation of the listed census blocks shall govern, except that when municipal boundary lines, waterways, shorelines, railroads, and municipal roads or streets are referenced in

the written legal descriptions of the legislative districts set forth below, such references in the written legal descriptions shall be dispositive of the intended district lines.

SECTION 4. If any provision of this Local Law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such determination shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof and shall not affect, impair, or invalidate any portion of Local Law 10-22 of the County of Chautauqua, including the portions of Local Law 10-22 amended by this Local Law, but shall be confined in its operation to the particular provision directly adjudged invalid.

SECTION 5. This Local Law shall become effective forty-five (45) days after adoption, or upon approval by a majority of the qualified electors in the event a permissive referendum is held in accordance with the Municipal Home Rule Law.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 65-12, Chautauqua County created one of the first five (5) authorized land bank corporations in New York State that was incorporated as the Chautauqua County Land Bank Corporation ("CCLBC"); and

WHEREAS, the mission of CCLBC is to "control and manage strategically selected dilapidated and abandoned residential and commercial properties acquired through the County tax foreclosure process, bank foreclosures and/or donations, and facilitate solutions aimed at stabilizing neighborhoods, encouraging private investment, and improving the quality of life throughout Chautauqua County;" and

WHEREAS, the CCLBC has secured \$6.92 million to date in grant funding through the NYS Office of Attorney General, primarily designated for demolition activities, neighborhood stabilization, side lot disposition, and the purchase of bank foreclosed properties; and

WHEREAS, to date CCLBC has successfully returned over 85 vacant lots and 118 residential structures to productive use, has leveraged approximately \$10,785,398 in private investment related to renovation activities, and has worked with the municipalities to demolish more than 170 residential and mixed-use properties county-wide at a cost to the Land Bank of nearly \$4,115,000; and

WHEREAS, based on historical sales, CCLBC has sold properties for approximately \$10,000 per property on average, and any "profits" realized by CCLBC are being reinvested directly back into improving the County's housing stock through a range of activities including renovation, side lot disposition, and demolition projects; and

WHEREAS, CCLBC aspires to become self-sustaining as it builds its capacity over time; therefore be it

TITLE: Calling on the State of New York to Continue to Pass-Thru Federal Affordable Care Act Enhanced Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage Funds

AT THE REQUEST OF: Chairman Pierre Chagnon, Legislator Davis

WHEREAS, the SFY 2024 State Budget proposal would end the Affordable Care Act (ACA) enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (eFMAP) federal pass-thru to counties and New York City; and

WHEREAS, the State is proposing to keep all of these federal savings going forward and use them to cover further expansions of Medicaid eligibility and benefits and to increase payments to health care providers; and

WHEREAS, the elimination of this ACA eFMAP federal pass-thru will require the 57 counties to spend at least \$280 million more in SFY 2024, and approximately \$1 billion when New York City is included; and

WHEREAS, the SFY 2024 costs to counties and New York City are scheduled to grow by 30 percent by SFY 2027; and

WHEREAS, it is the strong view of Chautauqua County that congress intended these federal savings to be shared with counties proportional to the amount they contributed toward the nonfederal Medicaid match; and

WHEREAS, since 2003, the state has shared the funds proportionally based on our analysis of savings we have received during periods when an enhanced federal Medicaid match was enacted by Congress; and

WHEREAS, enacted in 2011, the Medicaid statutory cap for all 62 counties is \$7.6 billion. The Medicaid statutory cap for the 57 counties outside of New York City is \$2.25 billion.; and

WHEREAS, starting in SFY 2014, New York began sharing these federal ACA savings directly with counties. The savings for a year were provided by lowering the weekly payments each county and NYC make to the state to support the State's Medicaid program. Through February 1, 2023, the state continues to share the federal savings from the ACA eFMAP with the 57 counties and NYC; and

WHEREAS, Chautauqua County strongly disagrees with the need to cut county funding so deeply when the Governor's budget proposes to fully fund its own reserves two years ahead of schedule de depositing \$5.4 billion into reserves before the end of SFY 2023, while also projecting a general fund surplus of \$35 billion by the end of SFY 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That calls on the State to continue to share these federal funds with counties as has been the precedent for over 20 years; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this motion be sent to Governor Kathy Hochul, Senator George Borrello, and Assemblyman Andrew Goodell.

TITLE: Urging New York State Approval For A New Brooks Hospital

AT THE REQUEST OF: Legislators Rankin, Bankoski, Muldowney, and Davis

WHEREAS, the Chautauqua County Legislature believes that the residents of northern Chautauqua County deserve high quality health care in a state-of-the-art hospital and related medical complex, and

WHEREAS, the 2016 State budget included an allocation of \$57 Million Essential Health Care Provider Support grant for a new medical complex for Brooks Hospital to serve northern Chautauqua County, and the 2017 budget included another \$17 Million Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Program grant for Kaleida in support of Brooks, and

WHEREAS, Brooks Hospital has submitted a proposal to the New York State Health Department for a new state-of-the-art hospital building and adjoining medical complex, which would improve health care services for northern Chautauqua County while dramatically reducing operating losses and saving taxpayers an estimated \$1 Million a month, and

WHEREAS, a blue ribbon task force consisting of local health care experts was formed by Dunkirk Mayor Wilfred Rosas, County Executive P.J. Wendel, Assemblyman Andrew Goodell, and Senator George Borrello to examine the proposal from Brooks Hospital with respect to the reasonableness of the services planned and the financial feasibility and advisability of a new hospital complex, and

WHEREAS, the task force consisted of Richard Ketcham, former CEO of Brooks Hospital and St. Elizabeth Medical Center; Dr. Robert Berke, former Chautauqua County Health Commissioner and primary care physician; Charles Nazzaro, CPA and formed CFO of UPMC Chautauqua; and Anthony Cooper, former CEO of Corning Hospital and Arnot Health System., and

WHEREAS, after meeting extensively with Brooks Hospital CEO Ken Morris, health care experts from Freed Maxick, and executives from Kaleida Health, and reviewing and evaluating a tremendous amount of health care and financial data and other relevant information, the task force unanimously recommended proceeding with the proposed new hospital building and adjoining medical office complex, and

WHEREAS, On January 23, 2023, Governor Kathy Hochul stated that a new hospital complex "is very important to our health team. ... It's important. It's a job creator. ... You need a place to get care when you are sick..."

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Chautauqua County Legislature hereby urges Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Health Department to approve the proposed new hospital and medical complex for Brooks Hospital and release the previously appropriated grant funds, and it is **FURTHER RESOLVED,** that Governor Kathy Hochul, with the support and cooperation from Senator George Borrello and Assemblyman Andrew Goodell, include additional funding in the 2023-2024 State Budget to fully fund any inflationary increases in construction costs since 2017, and it is

WHEREAS, the Chautauqua County Legislature believes that the residents of Chautauqua County deserve to be free from burdensome and costly regulations, and

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2023, during New York State Governor Kathy Hochul's 'State of the State' address, she proposed banning natural gas hookups in new building contractions statewide starting in 2025 and also proposed ending the sale of any natural gas or fossil fuel-based heating equipment in the state by 2035 saying "we will pursue one of the most ambitious and comprehensive efforts in the nation to fight climate change," and

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, nearly 60% of New York houses rely on natural gas for home heating and over 40% of the state's power generation comes from natural gas, and

WHEREAS, estimates for compliance with these new mandates requiring the replacement of major appliances like hot water heaters, furnaces, gas stoves, and gas dryers could range from \$27,327 to \$35,803 for a New York State household, and

WHEREAS, although these mandates will affect all New York residents, it will have a devastating effect on rural communities, low income residents, and the Amish community, and

WHEREAS, while the New York State economy is beginning to emerge from the pandemic, such mandates banning natural gas will likely stifle this economic growth, and

WHEREAS, based on data from the EPA, from 1990 to 2019 New York State's emissions of key pollutants have decreased across the board, and carbon dioxide emissions (CO2) have dropped over 24% in conjunction with increased natural gas use, pipeline infrastructure expansion and an improved grid, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Chautauqua County Legislature hereby urges Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to reconsider any mandates banning the use of natural gas, and it is

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chautauqua County Legislature hereby urges New York State to continue investment into natural gas and associated new technologies that so many New York residents' depend on for a low cost and reliable form of heat and power, and it is

FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this motion be sent to Governor Kathy Hochul, Senator George Borrello, and Assemblyman Andrew Goodell.
