LOCAL LAW INTRODUCTORY NO. <u>4-23</u> CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY

A LOCAL LAW ADOPTING THE VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTER AND VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE WORKER EXEMPTION FOR COUNTY REAL PROPERTY TAXES

BE IT ENACTED, by the County Legislature of the County of Chautauqua, New York as follows:

Section 1. <u>Purpose</u>. Pursuant to New York State Real Property Tax Law, certain enrolled members of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service or spouses are eligible for a partial exemption for real property taxes. The Chautauqua County Legislature, recognizing the important contributions of these volunteers, as well as the recruiting crisis currently affecting local departments, adopts the tax exemption as set out in Real Property Tax Law 466-a.

Section 2. <u>Adoption of Exemption for Volunteer Firefighters and Ambulance</u> <u>Workers</u>.

A) Real property owned by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service or such enrolled member and spouse meeting eligibility criteria as set out in Real Property Tax Law 466-a(2) residing in Chautauqua County shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of ten (10) percent of the assessed value of such property for County purposes, exclusive of special assessments, upon the enactment of this Local Law.

B) Such exemption shall be granted to certified volunteer members who have at least two (2) years of continuous and ongoing service and are certified by the company, department or service on such certification forms as promulgated by New York State and timely filed with the local assessor's office.

C) Any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who accrues more than twenty (20) years of active service and is so certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, shall be granted the ten (10) percent exemption as authorized by this section for the remainder of his or her life as long as his or her primary residence is located within Chautauqua County.

Section 3. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Local Law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State.

LOCAL LAW INTRODUCTORY NO. 5-23 CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY

A LOCAL LAW EXTENDING THE VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTER AND VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE WORKER EXEMPTION FOR COUNTY REAL PROPERTY TAXES TO CERTAIN ELIGIBLE UNREMARRIED SPOUSE

BE IT ENACTED, by the County Legislature of the County of Chautauqua, New York as follows:

Section 1. <u>Purpose</u>. Pursuant to New York State Real Property Tax Law, Chautauqua County adopted a local law granting a ten (10) percent real property tax exemption to certain volunteers of incorporated volunteer fire companies, fire departments or incorporated volunteer ambulance services, recognizing the important contributions of these volunteers, as well as the recruiting crisis currently affecting local departments. State law authorizes extension of this exemption, by separate local law, to unremarried spouses of certain volunteers eligible for the exemption.

Section 2. <u>Adoption of Exemption for Certain Unremarried Spouses.</u> (a) Where any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, is killed in the line of duty, the un-remarried spouse of the deceased member shall be granted the ten (10) percent exemption as authorized by this section pursuant to certification by the local department, provided that such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least five (5) years and such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to his or her death.

(b) Where any volunteer eligible for the lifetime 10% exemption granted after twenty years of service should predecease a spouse, such un-remarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member is eligible to continue the exemption from real property taxation as authorized by local law pursuant to the certification of the local department, provided that such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to his or her death.

Section 3. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Local Law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, Chautauqua County is blessed with many sources of fresh water, including several smaller lakes, streams and tributaries, Chautauqua Lake, and Lake Erie; and

WHEREAS, Chautauqua County Comprehensive Plan: Chautauqua 20/20 seeks to capitalize on the County's natural assets, especially its water sources, in order to grow the economy and improve the quality of life for its visitors and residents; and

WHEREAS, the Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) provides each region with the tools to create and implement its own roadmap for economic prosperity and job creation, and this community-based model uses local assets to drive local economic growth; and

WHEREAS, local waterfront revitalization plans for Northern Chautauqua County, that seek to identify projects and create and implement strategies to preserve and promote water resources to grow the economy, mitigate unsafe conditions, and improve the quality of life, were initiated in 1998 but never completed; and

WHEREAS, the Municipalities of the City of Dunkirk, Towns of Dunkirk, Hanover, Pomfret, Portland, Sheridan, Ripley, and Westfield; and the Villages of Silver Creek and Westfield are engaged in the development of eight individual Local Waterfront Revitalization Plans (LWRP) that will facilitate community-based waterfront planning and enable the flow of New York State Department of State grant funds for LWRP eligible projects; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 57-14, the County accepted a \$65,000 grant (CFA #25697) from the New York State Department of State (NYSDOS) for Phase I of the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 253-16, the County accepted a \$50,000 grant (CFA #51568) from the New York State Department of State (NYSDOS) for Phase II of the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program; and

WHEREAS, the County was awarded a \$193,500 grant (CFA #117829) from the NYSDOS for Phase III of the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program; and

WHEREAS, the cost of the project is estimated to be \$258,000, funded 75% from the NYSDOS for the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program and 25% from local sources; and

WHEREAS, Northern Chautauqua Community Foundation Local Economic Development Group, Chadwick Bay Group, and Lake Erie Management Commission have collaborated to provide matching funds of \$35,512, and pursuant to Resolution _____-23, budget amendments were adopted to recognize the \$10,000 contribution from the Lake Erie Management Commission; and
