We have audited the financial statements of the County of Chautauqua, New York (the "County") as of and for the year ended December 31, 2023, and have issued our report thereon dated August 12, 2024 (which report includes an emphasis of matter paragraph regarding the implementation of Governmental Accounting Standard Board ("GASB") Statement No. 96 and a reference to other auditors). Professional standards required that we advise you of the following matters relating to our audit.

Our Responsibility in Relation to the Financial Statement Audit

As communicated in our engagement letter dated June 4, 2024, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to form and express opinions about whether the financial statements that have been prepared by management with your oversight are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you or management of your respective responsibilities.

Our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit of financial statements includes consideration of the system of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, as part of our audit, we considered the system of internal control of the County solely for the purpose of determining our audit procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.

We are also responsible for communicating significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgment, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

We have provided our comments regarding other matters noted during our audit in a separate letter to you dated August 12, 2024.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope and timing we previously communicated to you.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate, and our firm have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Qualitative Aspects of the Entity's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the County is included in Note 1 to the financial statements. Except for the matters discussed below, there have been no initial selection of accounting policies and no changes in significant accounting policies or their application during the year ended December 31, 2023.

During the year ended December 31, 2023, the County implemented Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") Statements No. 94, *Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements*; No. 96, *Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements*; and a portion of No. 99, *Omnibus 2022*. GASB Statement No. 94 improves financial reporting by addressing issues related to public-private and public-public partnerships arrangements ("PPPs"). GASB Statement No. 96 improves financial reporting by establishing a definition for Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements ("SBITAs") and providing uniform guidance for accounting and financial reporting for transactions that meet that definition. GASB Statement No. 99 enhances comparability in the application of accounting and financial reporting requirements and improves the consistency of authoritative literature related to GASB Statements No. 94 and 96. The implementation of GASB Statement No. 96 is discussed in Note 2 to the financial statements. The implementation of GASB Statements No. 94 and a portion of 99 did not have a material impact on the County's financial position or results from operations.

No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Related Disclosures

Accounting estimates and related disclosures are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments.

The most sensitive accounting estimates affecting the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2023 are the allowance for doubtful accounts, liabilities for compensated absences, other post-employment benefits obligation, workers' compensation, health insurance, the net pension liability and landfill closure and post-closure costs.

Management's estimate of the allowance for doubtful accounts is based on past trends and estimated collectability. Management's estimate of the liability for compensated absences is based on available information regarding eligibility, leave balances accrued and current compensation

rates. Management's estimates of the liability for other postemployment benefits obligation, workers' compensation, health insurance, and the net pension liability are based on information obtained from third party specialists, including information obtained from third party administrators, attorneys and actuarial valuations performed by a consultant. Management's estimate of the liability for landfill closure and post-closure costs is based on historical costs and remaining number of years required to monitor the landfill. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop these estimates and determined that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole and in relation to the applicable opinion units.

Alternative Accounting Treatments

We discussed alternative method of revenue recognition, which is based on the County's internal policies and will be consistently applied year to year, with management. As of December 31, 2023, a long-term receivable for loans payable that is owed to the County in the amounts of \$2,202,744 and \$81,371 in the General Fund and Capital Projects Fund, respectively, has been recorded and offset within nonspendable fund balance. This method is an alternative accounting treatment within accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for policies and practices related to material items, including recognition, measurement, and disclosure considerations related to the accounting for specific transactions as well as general accounting policies, related to the December 31, 2023.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the County's financial statements relate to significant accounting policies and estimates, as described in Note 1 to the financial statements, as well as the disclosures related to risk management, contingencies, and the landfill closure and post-closure care cost, within Notes 9, 17, and 18, respectively.

Significant Difficulties Encountered during the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management relating to the performance of the audit.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the financial statements as a whole and each applicable opinion unit. At December 31, 2023, the County's County Road Fund inventory was overstated, while the Road Machinery Fund and Landfill Fund inventory was understated due to the timing and processing of year-end invoices and inventory consumption. As a result, governmental funds' fund balance is overstated and proprietary fund net position is understated by an amount that is less than tolerable error, and therefore is not considered material to the financial statements as of December 31, 2023.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of our audit procedures. No misstatements were identified by us as a result of our audit procedures that were considered material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, which could be significant to the County's financial statements or the auditors' report. No such disagreements arose during the course of the audit.

Representations Requested from Management

We have requested certain written representations from management, which are included in the attached letter dated August 12, 2024.

Management's Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Other Significant Matters, Findings or Issues

Drescher Maleiki LLP

In the normal course of our professional association with the County, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, operating and regulatory conditions affecting the entity, and operational plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the County's auditors.

- For nonexchange financial guarantees where we have declared liabilities, the amount of the liability recognized is the discounted present value of the best estimate of the future outflows expected to be incurred as a result of the guarantee. Where there was no best estimate but a range of estimated future outflows has been established, we have recognized the minimum amount within the range.

Significant estimates are estimates at the balance sheet date that could change materially within the next year. Concentrations refer to volumes of business, revenues, available sources of supply, or markets or geographic areas for which events could occur that would significantly disrupt normal finances within the next year.
- We have identified and disclosed to you the laws, regulations, and provisions of contracts and grant agreements that could have a direct and material effect on financial statement amounts, including legal and contractual provisions for reporting specific activities in separate funds.

• There are no:

- Violations or possible violations of laws or regulations, or provisions of contracts or grant agreements whose effects should be considered for disclosure in the financial statements or as a basis for recording a loss contingency, including applicable budget laws and regulations.

- The County's financial statements include the operations of the Chautauqua County Industrial Development Agency, the Chautauqua County Land Bank, and the Chautauqua County Tobacco Asset Securitization Corporation which are not included in the schedule or expenditures of federal awards during the year ended December 31, 2023.
- We are responsible for and have accurately completed the appropriate sections of the Data Collection Form and we are responsible for taking corrective action on audit findings of the compliance audit and have developed a corrective action plan that meets the requirements of the Uniform Guidance.

Draft Part 43 of NYCRR

With respect to New York Department of Transportation Assistance awards, we represent the following to you:

- The Schedule of Expenditures of New York Department of Transportation Assistance was prepared in accordance with the requirements of Draft Part 43 of the "New York State Codification of Rules and Regulations."
- Compliance with the laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements applicable to the County for state transportation assistance programs.
- Establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting and reporting on state transportation assistance.
- Identifying and disclosing to the auditor all laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that could have any direct and material effect on the preparation of financial statements or the audits required under these regulations.
- Identifying and disclosing to the auditor any and all known instances of material noncompliance, violations or possible agreements whose effects should be considered for disclosure in the financial statements or the audit documents required under these regulations or as a basis for recording a loss contingency claim.

Other Specific Representations

• We have not completed the process of evaluating the impact that will result from adopting the remainder of GASB Statement No. 99, *Omnibus 2022*; No. 100, *Accounting Changes and Error Corrections—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62*; and No. 101, *Compensated Absences*, effective for the year ending December 31, 2024; No. 102, *Certain Risk*

Disclosures, effective for the year ending December 31, 2025; and No. 103, Financial Reporting Model Improvements, effective for the year ending December 31, 2026. The County is, therefore, unable to disclose the impact that adopting GASB Statements No. 99, 100, 101, 102, and 103 will have on its financial position and results of operations when such statements are adopted.

- The County is responsible for determining and maintaining the adequacy of the allowance for doubtful notes, loans, interfund receivables, taxes receivable and accounts receivable, as well as estimates used to determine such amounts. Management believes the allowances are adequate to absorb currently estimated bad debts in the account balances.
- We agree with the work of specialists in evaluating the liabilities for workers' compensation, health insurance, other postemployment benefits, and the net pension liability and have adequately considered the qualifications of the specialists in determining amounts and disclosures used in the financial statements and underlying accounting records. We did not give any instructions, nor cause any instructions to be given, to specialists with respect to value or amounts derived in an attempt to bias their work, and we are not aware of any matters that have impact the independence or objectivity of the specialists.
- We have provided to you our views on reported audit findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as planned corrective actions.
- We have no intention of withdrawing from multi-employer pension plans, or taking any other action that could result in an effective termination or reportable events for any of the plans. We are not aware of any occurrences that could result in the termination of any of our multi-employer pension plans to which we contribute. We believe the actuarial assumptions and methods used to measure pension liabilities and costs for financial accounting purpose are appropriate in the circumstances.
- We are unable to determine the possibility of a withdrawal liability in a multi-employer benefit plan.
- The County labor agreements and County Legislature rules and regulations provide for sick leave, vacations, and miscellaneous other paid absences. Upon retirement, certain eligible employees qualify for paid hospitalization insurance premiums and/or payment for fractional values of unused sick leave. Estimated sick leave and compensatory time accumulated by governmental fund type employees has been recorded as a liability and expenditure in the governmental-wide financial statements. Payment of sick leave and compensatory time is dependent upon many factors; therefore, timing of future payments is not readily determinable. Management believes that sufficient resources will be made available for the payments of sick leave and compensatory time when such payments become due.
- The County has elected to present the Chautauqua County Land Bank Corporation as a major enterprise fund.
- The County is in compliance with the Office of the New York State Comptroller's reporting requirements relating to the New York State property tax cap and tax freeze programs.
- The County considers encumbrances in excess of \$250,000 to be significant.

- The County has reclassified certain Chautauqua Tobacco Asset Securitization Corporation ("CTASC") items in the financial statements. Government-wide expenditures identified as bond issuance costs have been included as accreted interest on the reconciliation of the statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances—governmental funds to the government-wide statement of activities as the County does not believe these amounts appropriately represent bond issuance expenses.
- The County has determined that the ending balance in construction in progress represents ongoing capital projects that have not yet been completed, and as such do not represent depreciable assets.
- The County reports nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned and unassigned fund balances. The County has nonspendable balances of \$5,768,824, restricted balances of \$13,878,571, assigned balances of \$11,298,112 and unassigned balance of \$46,841,632 within its governmental funds for the year ended December 31, 2023.
- At December 31, 2023, the County had a deficit net position of \$515,886 in the Workers' Compensation Fund within the Internal Service Funds. This deficit is the result of year-end case reserves and reserves for incurred but not reported claims that are related to the County's general operations, which are primarily long-term in nature. This deficit is anticipated to be remedied through future charges to the operating funds and the enterprise funds. The Workers' Compensation Fund charges the general operations of the County for actual claims paid on a pay-as-you-go basis.
- We have disclosed to you all lease and subscription-based information technology arrangement ("SBITA") contracts and have established a reporting threshold of \$100,000 for lease and SBITA liabilities and receivables.
- During the year ended December 31, 2023, the County implemented GASB Statement No. 96, *Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements*. As a result of the implementation, the County's capital assets and long-term liabilities were restated as of December 31, 2022. Accordingly, net position of governmental activities at December 31, 2022 has been restated from \$127,576,054 to \$127,572,559.
- In addition to audit services, based on information in the County's trial balance, Drescher & Malecki LLP has assisted the County in preparing the County's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2023. In conjunction with the prepartion of the financial statements, the County has performed the following functions:
 - Made all management decisions and performed all management functions.
 - Designated Kitty Crow, Director of Finance, who we believe has suitable skill, knowledge, and/or experience has overseen the aforementioned service.
 - Evaluated the adequacy of the services performed.
 - Evaluated and accepted responsibility for the results of the services performed.
 - Established and maintained controls, including a process to monitor the system of internal control.

County management understands that Drescher & Malecki has not performed any
management functions or made management decisions on behalf of the County. Any
nonattest services were performed in accordance with the applicable professional standards
issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.
